Club members were reminded to speak with **Lenny Holzband** about *Temple Emanu El's 5th Annual Classic & Collectible Car Show* to be held October 29.

Guest Speaker

Tonight we were honored to have a very special guest speaker, **Jess Hewitt**, a gasoline chemist from Gulf Oil and Manager of Gulf Racing Fuels. There will likely be more about Jess's fascinating talk to our Club elsewhere in this newsletter, but he mainly discussed the damage that ethanol fuels do to our antique engines and fuel systems and the recent availability of nonethanol fuels in the Houston area.

Jess showed us a short film to demonstrate that ethanol in our modern fuel is hygroscopic - which means that it absorbs water from the atmosphere. But water is not the only problem with ethanol-"enhanced" fuel. Jess said that ethanol keeps eating away at whatever it's going through (like hoses and gaskets), not unlike like *some* people around food and drink.

One of the fuels that Jess and his team developed and tested is Gulf Marine. It uses non-hygroscopic chemicals to replace ethanol. And in addition to not absorbing water, it doesn't create acids that break down hoses and gaskets. Thankfully, this fuel is now available at fuel retailers in and around Houston.

Jess also answered Club members' questions had about fuel. Someone asked about the importance of octane to an older engine. Jess said that the quality of the fuel was more important than the octane in most cases and reminded us that our antique car engines' valve seats need to be hardened to deal with unleaded fuels.

Tahl Rozycki asked if it is necessary to fill a tank completely to minimize absorption of water when using ethanol fuels. Jess said it does not help. Julie Wagner asked if non-ethanol gasoline would lessen the risk of vapor lock. "Yes", was Jess's short answer.

Other News to Amuse

The talk about gasoline reminded **Jim Johnston** about the first time he saw late-member **Don Boggus's** 1976 Pontiac Bonneville Brougham. It was at a Texas Tour, and Jim asked Don how it ran. Don said, "Get in. I need to go get gas."

The December, 2007 **cover car** was a 1956 Buick Riviera Roadmaster Model 72 owned by Daniel and Charlene Matheson.

This car weighed in at 4,355 pounds and had a base price of \$3,692. Standard features included (take a deep breath) windshield washers and wide angle wipers, backup lights, brake warning lights, foam rubber cushioned dash, glare proof rearview mirror, dual exhaust, electric clock, full wheel covers, automatic trunk compartment light, adjustable rear license plate holder, power brakes, power steering, power windows, perimeter heating, power seats, and Daytona weave carpeting. Options were Frigidaire air conditioning, tissue dispenser, visor mounted vanity mirror, redline speedometer, temperature, gasoline, oil pressure, and amp gauges. The only two options that were missing were power antenna and floor button to activate the station changer for the Selectronic AM high fidelity radio.

In his Taxi Tales column, Stan Erickson described his and Mrs. Erickson's participation in the 38th and "Farewell" Cav-Oil-Cade tour put on by the Port Arthur club. *On the Road Again: Pate's Hidden Treasures

with Robert McLellan

A necessity in collecting old cars, parts and auto literature is to have some place to store it. That problem was solved when my wife and I bought our first house in the Spring of 1973. Swap meets are a good place to find what I wanted and my first venture to the South Central Swap Meet, later called the Pate Swap Meet, was in 1975. It was the third year of the swap meet and as many of you know, it was organized by Barney Calvert of the Gulf Coast Region AACA out of Houston, in 1972. I must admit that I was not impressed with what seemed like a Ford parts meet. Now understand, I love Fords, but at that time I was more interested in 1950s sports cars and prewar luxury cars. It was a real laugh to ask vendors, "What do you have foreign or in sports car parts and literature?" and watch the vendors scowl and shake their heads. I pursued my quest and over the years I have turned up an amazing amount of literature and parts. But at that time, Fords seemed to be the most popular cars in our Gulf Coast AACA region when I joined in 1975. I regret that I dropped out of the club after a few years only to join again recently. Times changed and so did the members and their cars.

After the Pate Swap Meet moved its location, I continued going until about 15 years ago. I did not miss a single year until then. I was first a vender in the 1980s and I got more serious as time went along. I sold primarily old car literature that I considered to not meet my standards for resale through my mail order business. I had created McLellan's Automotive History, a literature business in 1960 and it was a part time business until 1985. From then on to 2014 is was a full time business until I closed it. Pate was fun, profitable and full of surprises. One early morning on the first day, I walked up to a table where a fellow was stacking boxes and I asked him if he had any literature. He pointed at two boxes and said his neighbor died and his wife told him to get rid of those. I opened the first box and had a panic attack, opened the second box and my heart was racing. Stuttering, I said, "What do you want for both boxes?". He said, "What will you give me?". Shaking, I handed him a couple of twenties and he said, "Ok". I quickly lugged off about 100 pounds of literature across the field. I did not know what I had until I put them into my station wagon. Yes, it was just as I anticipated. Duesenberg, Pierce-Arrow, Stutz, Cadillac, Packard, Roll-Royce and all the prewar literature that dreams are made of and in beautiful condition. That was not the first time that I got lucky as Pate always was a treasure hunt. Now let you about my biggest find.

In 1994 the swap meet had moved and the Pate Museum of Transportation was shipping out their car collection and clearing out the area. Do you remember those railroad box cars that used to form a line by the museum? You probably thought they were empty. They were actually filled with donated collections of auto related items that were too plentiful to put into the museum. As the museum was being emptied, the curator of the museum, prior to having the box cars hauled off, decided to look inside. To his surprise they were filled with memorabilia, parts and, oh yes, auto literature. 40 Million Fire Extinguishers Recalled

Just recently a recall was announced involving 40 million fire extinguishers manufactured by Kidde. The recall involves 134 models of Kidde fire extinguishers manufactured between January 1, 1973 and August 15, 2017, including models that were previously recalled in March 2009 and February 2015. Be advised that some of the recalled extinguishers were sold under names other than Kidde (i.e. Fuller Brush, Honeywell, Montgomery Ward, Sears and other names).

Given how many AACA members have fire extinguishers for their vehicles, we have no doubt that some AACA members have extinguishers that are being recalled. Please take action on this situation immediately and be sure to share this information with all of your region and chapter members as soon as possible.
